

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

I clearly remember buying my first piece of original art. I was on a business trip to San Francisco, wandering the business district on a warm summer evening and stopped in at a gallery - in itself an unusual occurrence because I was not really interested in art at that stage of my life. I was an engineer, in my late twenties, and didn't know the difference between oils and watercolors or any other distinction in the art world. There was this painting, though. It called out to me. I studied it, listened carefully as the attendant told me about the scene, a bit about the technique used to produce it and the artist... all of which have long since faded from memory. But that picture... I had to have it. I paid \$275, the equivalent of about \$1400 today. An unimaginable sum for a frugal young guy with little taste or interest in things artistic. I still have that painting, of course, and it has brought much pleasure throughout all these years, and not just for its artistic value. When I look at it, it brings back strong memories of who I was at that stage of my life, even though (or perhaps because of) how out-of-character it was for me to make this purchase. Only now that I am on the other side such a transaction can I appreciate that I was also bringing joy to the artist who created this masterpiece, helping both her and the gallery to continue to do what they do to bring beauty into the world. I think I'll go to the other room and have a look at my treasure.

THEME SHOWS 2023:

Theme shows are open to members and non-members alike.

To Participate: Bring your work to the gallery on the drop off date for each exhibit with your completed entry form (located at the gallery and seacoastartist.com).

Fee for SAA members: \$10.00 per piece up to two pieces, **non-members:** \$20.00 per piece up to two pieces. Pieces OVER 16"x20" up to 22"x26" INCLUDING FRAME \$20.00/\$40.00. You may enter one oversize and one 16"x20" or smaller. SAA receives 25% commission on all sales.

Presentation /Framing: We ask that work fits the theme for the month and framed in a professional manner complete with a wire hanger and properly labeled on the back with artist, title, medium, and price. For a more consistent appearance on the wall, we recommend frames of brown, black, gold, or silver.

Awards: Many theme shows offer Best in Show and People's Choice Awards. Different factors are considered when awarding Best in Show such as originality, expertise in a specific medium, presentation, subject matter, design, relevance to the stated theme and whether the piece is an original work of art. Keep in mind that for non-photography entries, reproductions such as giclée prints, prints that are not numbered (and are not hand pulled) and other reproductions are not considered for Best in Show. However, all art hanging in the show is eligible for the People's Choice Award. The Best in Show winner will be awarded a free entry in the next Theme Show of the winner's choosing!

Receptions will be held the second Fridays of the month from 5-7 pm.

Winter's art is everywhere in New England; on oak leaves, the skating pond, and every windshield. BODY OF WORK SHOW JAN/FEB 2023:

CHERYL SAGER - JAN: "WINTER WHIMSY"

I have always loved watercolor painting and added learning how to my "bucket list." In 2014-15 I began taking watercolor painting classes with Doris Rice, a well-known watercolorist and teacher who provides many painting opportunities, as well as critique, suggestions and encouragement. Taking all of this to heart, I began entering SAA Theme Shows, and signed up for a couple of Body of Work shows. Additionally, I show and sell artwork at various art shows in the Seacoast and have even taken on a few commissions. All of my pieces are original works as I makes no prints, thus making each painting "one of a kind." This includes the images on my cards, which can be removed, matted and framed. Each painting is signed and dated on the front and back. When you look for my signature on the front you will have to be a bit of detective because my signature is hidden within the painting. I hope you enjoy the search!

In this Body of Work Show I wanted to share the beauty and fun of Winter. Several of the paintings take you to special places in New Hampshire, while others share various activities that make Winter special. So whether whimsical, majestic, fun or serious, the beauty of Winter is here.

SARAH OPPENHEIMER - JAN: "INSIDE, OUTSIDE, UPSIDE DOWN"

I am a Modern Romantic artist from Kingston, NH. By profession, I have been a teacher of young children, but making things and painting has always been a part of my life. Favorite mediums include, but are not limited to, watercolor, oil, glitter and paper. As a gardener, walker, traveler and lover of animals, I find inspiration in nature. When stuck inside, I paint what is available. Currently I am an art student at the University of New Hampshire and take classes at the Currier Museum. I find inspiration in color, line shape, art history and architectural corners. As a reader I find inspiration in literature.

My mini show at Seacoast Artist Association is titled - "Inside, Outside, Upside Down." The title is respectfully borrowed from Stan and Jan Berenstain. In it you will find works painted inside, some outside and yes, one that works upside down. My work has been exhibited in my mother's pantry, and now in my children's homes, local libraries and coffee houses and a few small galleries. I am happily finding a home here at Seacoast Artist Association.

SKIP BERRIEN - FEB: "MAINELY MAINE"

My approach to painting continually evolves and is often experimental. Here I present essentially two bodies of work...one largely blue and crisp while the other is dominated by the red underpainting using a softer brush. Each evokes a different atmosphere...at least for me and maybe for you as well.

About 20 years ago while out on Monhegan, I contemplated painting as I approached retirement from medicine. I have never regretted that inspiration which has permitted me to experiment with color, composition, texture and modes of expression.

These particular paintings reflect our summers in Downeast Maine where my wife and I enjoy the vigor and solitude of the coast as well as the character of the region. The adventure with paint continues as I explore the "still lives" of nature and find expression for the spaces we pass through and inhabit.

SAA member Bill Childs has this to say about Skip's work: "I have been fascinated with Skip Berrien's painting since he joined us here at Seacoast Art Association. He continues to work in a variety of approaches to painting from a conventional use of color and composition to more expressive and subjective approaches. In a few of his recent works he seems to let a variety of strokes of color become apparent in suggesting his images but leaving the final resolution to the viewer."

KATHY STATIRES - FEB: "FRESH OFF THE BOAT: PAINTING ALONG THE NEW ENGLAND COAST"

After retiring from teaching art for many years, I had the desire to focus on my own artwork. Since I enjoy the outdoors, painting as a plein air artist made sense. I've been painting outdoors for the past six years.

My husband always had a boat at the ocean, so I've been in love with painting from his boat. Then, of course, looking at other subjects close to the ocean. Most of my paintings have water in some part of my works of art.

I paint with oils but also enjoy working with pastels and watercolors. When I'm outside, planning mycomposition, I usually start with some thumbnail sketches before drawing on my canvas. Then I visualize and paint an underpainting showing the different values. Adding color is my last step, and if I don't have time to finish it, I'll take notes on mixing my colors for completion. Most often I finish my paintings in my home studio.

Winners Announced at Annual SAA Members Awards Show

"A strong, lively and delightfully diverse show," is how local artist, author and teacher Christopher Volpe described the Seacoast Artist Association's annual Members Awards show held at the Exeter Town Hall gallery after he juried the winners. "I found it such a pleasure to be introduced to so many artists who are new to me," he added. 65 SAA members submitted 115 works of art that was shown over two weekends.

Writing about first prize winner Sydney Thomas's oil painting, 'At the Mirror II,' Chris says, "Though I was initially taken with the unusual, deftly executed composition of the figure and her surroundings, it was the subtle touch of where the figure's attention is anchored that charmed me the most. For although beauty is the central motif, it's the beauty of the flowers the figure is admiring, rather than her own image, which adds a gentle lyrical twist and suggests a larger narrative outside the frame."

Second prize winner, oil and cold wax painting "Purple Mountain" by Lynn Krumholz, "smolders with ominous intensity that activates the whole work," he wrote. "The near monochrome stark contrasts and subtle gradations of dark and light have a direct, elemental quality that pulls the viewer further and further into contemplation.

Kevin Talbot's photograph on canvas 'Mount Washington Observatory' which won third prize "jumped off the wall at me because of its stark darkness, unusual color modulations and striking drama. The overall strangeness of the image rather than being off-putting, slowly reveals the unfamiliar character that our world assumes at its extremes.

Honorable Mention winner oil painting "The Sheep" by Adele Buchwald "reflects the artist's sensitive and intuitive ability to translate the life of animals into art," says Chris. "These three amigos have an abundance of character that never becomes excessive, reminding us that the remarkable awaits under the surface of the everyday. Lovely rendering and tonalities in the rustic setting as well." All the leaves in the other Honorable Mention winner acrylic and watercolor monoprint, 'Letting Go' by Heather Crowley, are hand painted with acrylic directly on the actual leaf and then printed onto the watercolor paper. Chris says, "I felt a strong sense of spirituality in this mandala-like composition. The addition of fiery braids adds intriguing intensity to a subtle vision of the Tree of Life."

There was a tie for the People's Choice award, voted on by attendees: "The Three Sisters" by Brian Lessard and "Late Night" by Sue Hennigan.

Thanks to committee members Charlene Blomquist, Anita Freeman, and Dave Turbide for organizing this show! Stay tuned for details about a new members show at the Town Hall this coming spring!
