PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

SAA exists for one main reason – to promote visual art in the seacoast area. Of course, there are multiple means and methods for doing that, and multiple side benefits for the member artists, members who are supporters of the arts, and our young artist scholarship recipients. And let's not forget the seacoast community who benefit from access to the fine art and related activities like classes, receptions, and events.

The visible base of operations for SAA is our Water Street gallery. We also display member works at the Exeter Inn, at the old town hall on occasion, and we are working on identifying other venues to expand our presence and offer more opportunities to get art "out there" where people can see and enjoy our work.

All of these activities have costs – in money and especially in effort. As a non-profit, we only strive to bring in as much money as we need to carry out our activities. That allows us to keep our dues and fees low, much lower than most other galleries and art associations. We are an all-volunteer organization; while we have a core group of artists and members that generously donate the time and effort needed to make all this work, it can be a struggle to add activities like the new Spring Member Show scheduled for the month of May. Members may have noticed several emails from me over the last couple months seeking help with that May show. There will undoubtedly be more of the same as we continue to expand our reach across the seacoast area.

As SAA members or future members, please consider donating a bit of time to help SAA continue to promote art on the seacoast and expand the opportunities to reach out to the community. Most of our volunteers only dedicate a few hours now and then but their participation means the world to us. There are lots of things that our volunteers do that don't require artistic talent, technical skill, physical labor, or travel (some tasks can be completed remotely). THEME SHOWS 2023:

Theme shows are open to members and non-members alike.

To Participate: Bring your work to the gallery on the drop off date for each exhibit with your completed entry form (located at the gallery and seacoastartist.com).

Fee for SAA members: \$10.00 per piece up to two pieces, **non-members:** \$20.00 per piece up to two pieces. Pieces OVER 16"x20" up to 22"x26" INCLUDING FRAME \$20.00/\$40.00. You may enter one oversize and one 16"x20" or smaller. SAA receives 25% commission on all sales.

Presentation /Framing: We ask that work fits the theme for the month and framed and/or presented in a professional manner complete with a wire hanger and properly labeled on the back with artist, title, medium, and price. For a consistent appearance on the wall, we recommend frames of brown, black, gold, or silver. **Awards:** Many theme shows offer Best in Show and People's Choice Awards. Different factors are considered when awarding Best in Show such as originality, expertise in a specific medium, presentation, subject matter, design, relevance to the stated theme and whether the piece is an original work of art. Keep in mind that for non-photography entries, reproductions such as giclée prints, prints that are not numbered (and are not hand pulled) and other reproductions are not considered for Best in Show. However, all art hanging in the show is eligible for the People's Choice Award. The Best in Show winner will be awarded a

free entry in the next Theme Show of the winner's choosing!

BODY OF WORK SHOW MARCH/APRIL 2023:

RS BENSE - MAR: "ISOLATION AND INSPIRATION"

These hauntingly familiar, otherworldly pieces were born out of the isolation experienced from the pandemic. The stay-at-home guidelines gave me lots of time to create. While I was cleaning and organizing my studio, I stumbled across some strangely sized ultra-high quality watercolor paper. In keeping with my New England roots, I just had to find a way to use it. Thus, this series of long and skinny landscapes was born. As usual, I am engaged in the process and not really doing any deep thinking. I am just playing around. I taped off a section of the paper for the "real" art and used the sides to test my colors. I was being particular about the testing, making deliberate areas of color. I was taking a class with Doris Rice, and she saw it and said, "Those look like remarques." I quipped "What is a remarque?" It turns out that artists will sometimes paint in the margins of the print, thereby creating a remarque. "Cool," I thought, and I kept doing my color studies on the sides of the pieces. I took the body of work to the framer, and I have to thank Rob at The Gilded Edge Frame Shop for telling me to keep these remarques in the framed piece. I am sure I would have covered them up!

JUDY ARNOLD - MAR: "FOR GRANTED"

You don't know what you've got till it's gone. So Joni Mitchell told us, and as I age, those words ring even truer. Change is constant and inevitable. But what once progressed at a sluggish creep, now assaults us at an epic pace. The cost and availability of goods. The state of our union. Restaurant survival. Ease of travel. Sustainability of our planet. Shifting politics. The past few years have raised the curtain on so much that I once took for granted. It makes my head spin.

When a building and business that I loved and depended on was suddenly lost to fire, personal change was thrust upon me, leading to a new appreciation of the every day places in my world. I began to look at everything around me with fresh eyes, and questioned my assumptions that familiar sights would be everlasting. They won't. Basements of some Strawbery Banke Museum buildings are sustaining water damage from the rising sea and crumbling. Almost thirty 80-year old trees in a Portsmouth neighborhood are being removed to install new sidewalks. Large residential developments are rising like mushrooms all over Southern New Hampshire.

Each day I pass by pastoral scenes, antique barns, quirky shops and centuries old homes. I practice appreciation of those sights which bring me joy — and I take nothing for granted.

ELLEN KINGSBURY - APR: "NOTHING BUT BLUE SKIES"

I am a life-long hiker, skier and tennis player who loves being outside in all kinds of weather. As I have learned and enjoyed making art, I have especially enjoyed painting and collaging skies, clouds and the light. This show highlights my recent Plein Air work as well as working with cut paper and collage.

I have been drawing and painting for 15 years and have studied with many teachers over the years. I don't make any one kind of art. I love drawing the figure and have been in figure drawing groups for 10+ years. I work in encaustic and once set up my garage with all the equipment needed to make encaustic paintings. I enjoy collage and have bags of printed papers in boxes with scissors and glue. Some times when I paint sharp edges with acrylics and other times when I use loose washes of watercolor for an abstract piece. I love printing with Gelli plates and creating funky designs for collage or a get-well card for a friend. I'm not sure if the journey will end with expertise in representational art or whether I'll make a big name for myself in abstract expressionism, but I know that along the way I'm having a ball!

MARCIA TRAHAN - APR: "TAKING THE LONG VIEW"

For as long as I have been painting, landscapes and big skies have drawn me in. I may set out to create a scene with a closer horizon, but inevitably the question of what's beyond that hill, field, or tree intrigues both me and my paint brush and off we go to find out.

As a native New Englander and recent transplant to New Hampshire my heart and mind are full of beautiful images and lovely palettes with which to experiment. Many of my paintings begin with a reference photo or sketch of a scene and then morph into something imagined or intuited. My preference is to work in oil as I love the richness, depth of color and versatility I find in this medium. I'm mostly self-taught, but have taken classes with Amy Brnger, Kathleen Robbins, and Erin Spencer. Having such an inspiring arts community on the Seacoast has brightened many a day and helped me meet the challenges the last several years with a sense of purpose and optimism.

Whether I'm painting in my home studio space or attempting to capture a moment in plein air, for me, the unique characteristics of each brush stroke and mix of color present both challenges and satisfactions in equal measure.
